R/C SWAP/SELL EVENT:



RECONSTRUCTING A CLASSIC –



The “Ball of Tape”. The very name has a very special place in the hearts of every DownEast Soaring Member. How many members learned to fly, slope, crash and burn on this most hallowed of airframes? How many club members shed a tear when the famed bird was reported as finished? Oh, to gaze again upon the famed red, white and blue trim soaring majestically over Clark’s Cove.

Cry no more dear readers, for this most holy of relics flies once more!

When my nephew Anthony and I picked the plane up, it lay nearly forgotten on Jeff’s basement floor. It lay bent and broken in a black box, forgotten among a potpourri of receivers, servos and sundry parts.

When we got to the shop, Anthony and I surveyed the damage. The port side of the fuselage was not quite ‘gone’, but nearly so. The malady was hidden well, for the plane had been not-so-lovingly wrapped with several generations of red packing tape. Like archeologists on a dig, we slashed feverishly at the tape to see what the inside looked like. Only, there was no inside. The core consisted of a finely ground sprinkling of granulated EPP foam. Imagine those little remnants of popcorn at the bottom of a bowl. Add a ruthless strangling with red packing tape. Toss in some broken servos and related parts.



So that was our challenge –to fix the front of the fuselage. To fix something that didn’t really exist.

Anthony and I decided to rebuild the fuselage with EPP foam. That way many future generations of DownEasters could whack the bird up even more. We gathered some scrap EPP foam of various sizes and widths. No one was big enough to do the job.

So we cut about six pieces and made a brickwork that was quite a bit bigger than the original fuselage. The photos show the progression of the brick puzzle. The whole business was glued together with that magical adhesive “Household Goop.” What a great world we live in. One glue - so many uses.



The next problem was how to restore the original shape of the Ball of Tape. We brought in a professional consultant. Tim Accord. For us, it was like interviewing Michaelangelo about the construction of his marble “David.” How had Tim constructed the unmistakable profile of this classic plane?



“With a turkey knife,” Tim advised. “Just hacked it out with an electric turkey knife on the dining room table.”

But we didn’t have a turkey knife. And my wife said we couldn’t use the table. So Anthony and I we used a “Stanley” wood rasp – in the garage. We gradually shaped the port side to mimic the original visage that was fairly intact on the starboard side of the fuselage.

When we finished shaping, we still had a problem. We had

grafted a good-looking rubbery foam nose on a relatively rigid rear fuselage. But the new snout flapped around like an elephant's trunk. So we routed out some slots on the top and bottom and glued in two stringers on top and one on the bottom. For glue we used – well, you know, Household Goop. The adhesive of the gods!

We tied the stringers into the rear portion of the fuselage about four inches back. The elephant's trunk flaps no more. You can see the stringers being fitted in a couple of the photos.

Then we marked the locations for the battery, receiver, switch and servo. The photos show where we put everything.



We taped her up and did some test glides in a local field. Then we headed for the cove.

Yes, it flies very nicely, thank you.

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COLD BATTERY TEST



TEST SETUP:

- I peaked each 4 cell pack discharged at room temp, peaked again then put in my freezer (10d F) for approx 1/2 hour then discharged again.
- I used a Sirius discharger (http://www.siriuselectronics.com/supr_tst.htm) which discharges to 1.1v per cell and I set to a load of 250mAh.
- The packs were in the freezer the entire time. The discharger was left out of the freezer.
- Also, the alkaline measured 5.6v right out of the freezer, as soon as I applied load (discharge again) the voltage dropped immediately to 4.4+ and I got less than 60mAh before the discharger shut off.

RESULTS: The following chart shows the results. It indicates that the NiMH packs had the least loss (i.e., 24%). The important thing to note is the NiMH packs are 1600 NiMH. A 25% loss would still give you 1200 mah. This is two times a 600 NiCD pack before any loss. Wow! That is fantastic. - JA

BOTTOM LINE: I'm sticking to my 1600 mah NiMH rechargeable...

October 27th 2002 Brattleboro, Vermont

We held our breath while the weather went all through all sorts of extremes leading up to contest day. Saturday (the day before) I woke to icy snow. The temp was stuck around 38° all day and the slush never seemed to melt. I had visions of a few hearty souls standing around in an empty frozen landscape the next morning. --Contest Day dawned with a warm fog that quickly burned off to a calm sunny morning. I could fly in this! Heck, this was one of the better days of the year (comfort-wize).

We got off to a slow start as the distance travelers straggled in and I called the Pilot's meeting around 10:15. With a dozen flyers we had few frequency conflicts and we flew an open winch format for R.E.S. and Unlimited. The first task was a relaxed 6 minutes with the idea that we would raise the task time as the lift

improved. As it turned out we stayed with 6 minutes while the lift came and went with intermittent gusty winds. Picking your air seemed to be the most important part of the contest.

The first round started with great air and ended with a 20 MPH crosswind as the thermals passed. Jim Tyrie chose his air well and flew a 6:10 and 78 landing to lead the round. Ron Cichowski was looking better with a 6:04 but only managed a 36 on the landing. Steve Syrotiak came up with 5:54 and small change on the landing.

John Hayes and Dave Hague were both flying Majestics in RES and were within 1 point of each other at the end of round one. RES landings were 50 point in/out while Unlimited class had a 100 point graduated landing.

Jim Tyrie really found his groove on the second flight with a 5:59 and a 97 point landing. I redeemed myself after a dismal first round with a 5:52 - 97. John Hayes also got his time and landing again to hold on to the lead in RES.

The temps continued mild and the sun was in and out as the big cloud streets moved though. It was so mild that Ben Tucker, our scorekeeper, sat around in short sleeves all day! Ben, a high school senior, built the Excell spreadsheet the night before. Rod Peterson, the force behind the YSFA and a co-sponsor of the Pumpkin Fly-off brought his dependable winches and retrievers to the event and the performed flawlessly. Rod also managed to do a little contest flying when not running the winch.



After lunch the gusts eased up but the lift became less predictable. Those of us who went up early chased good air downwind but others were clobbered by the sudden chill of down air. I had a respectable 6:03 with some landing points and Dave Hague got 5:58 (his best contest time ever) to take the lead in RES.

When the dust settled, Tyrie's early rounds saved his lead from a disastrous 3rd round. It seems everybody had at least one "stinker round" in Unlimited but those two majestics were fighting it out tooth and nail in RES. After checking the totals Dave Hague squeaked out his first win in RES.

We called it a day promptly at 2:10 and handed out trophies (inscribed Mugs to 1st place, T-shirts for 2nd and third place). Jim Tyrie had 1st in Unlimited, I managed 2nd and Steve Syrotiak placed 3rd. Dave Hague finished 1st in RES and his score would have put him in 3rd place in unlimited. We could have gotten in another round but many had a long ride home and we had just turned the clocks back. Those who wanted got in some fun-flying between rounds. All in all it was determined to be a swell contest day with comfortable weather and challenging flying, a great way to end the thermal contest season.
